


tury were bestowed by friends and associates to Rush Baldwin, Austin business man

and civic worker, in funeral services held Saturday at 10 a.m. at the family residence, 1205 West Ninth

Hundreds of friends from every walk in life, representing every creed and denomination, assembled at the home as a mark of their es-teem for one who had labored in community service and one whose kindly spirit had touched them when they needed a kindly word or a helpful act on his part.

Esteem Summarized

Business men ranging from bankers to the young men who are start-ing on their business careers stood with bared heads for nearly an hour

in tribute to their friend, their col-league, and their associate. Particularly were observed em-ployers and employes of the other propers and employes of the other printing firms, who paused from their work to join; in the community tribute to a leader of their craft, whose career was cut short by an unfortunate automobile accident lost Saturday morning on the Houston highway three miles east of Manor highway of Manor.

The esteem in which Mr. Baldwin was held was summarized by the Rev. Virgil H. Fisher, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating at the service, during his tribute,
"Jew and gentile, Catholic and Protestant have assembled around the bier of a friend," Dr. Fisher said. "He loved the Sisters who attended him at the infirmary and as they prayed, he felt that their prayers were mingled with his."

Definite Service

Dr. Fisher declared that Mr. Baldwin rendered a service to the wealthy and to the lowly and contributed a definite service to humanity.

the kindness which Mr. Baldwin also manifested toward him "when he took the copy for our church bulletin down to the firm to have lt printed."

Poem Read

The service was opened with a quartet singing "Come Ye Disconsolate," after which the Rev. Fisher rend Scriptural passages from John 14, the 14th Psalm, and Revelation 22:14, including the words "Let not your heart be troubled · · · in my Father's house are many mansions . . God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" and other con-soling words of a comforting Mas-

Dr. Fisher then gave his tribute and ended this with a poem enti-tled "Still, Still With Thee," after which the quartet, composed of Mrs. Fred Caldwell, Mrs. Serena Howe Larson, Roy Lane and Homer W. Grifflits, sang Cardinal Now-man's hymn "Lend Kindly Light."

Final Benediction

The Baldwin home was laden with the floral tributes of friends and three flower cars carried them to the grave in Oakwood cemetery. where the body of Mr. Baldwin was placed by six of his associates in the firm of A. C. Baldwin & Sons which Mr. Baldwin served as treasurer.

Members of the Austin Rotary club which Mr. Baldwin served as secretary at the time of his death and previously as director and president, were named honorary pullbearers. The Rotarians mourned the passing of one who had held a perfect attendance record since joining the organization on Sept. 17, 1917.

Services at the graveside were brief with the Rev. Virgil Fisher reciting a prayer and giving a final benedletion and the quartet singing "Have Thine Own Way."
